Speaker: Jane O'Brien

Jane O'Brien gave an absorbing talk on the history of damask cloth and how it has influenced her work. With a background in interior design where she used the fabric for her commercial and domestic clients, she became fascinated by the lustrous properties which have made it desirable since Roman times. She illustrated the history via a series of well-known classic paintings from medieval to Tudor and Renaissance times, when it was the fabric of choice for the rich and powerful who displayed their status through the clothes they wore. The motifs which were created in early times - the pomegranates, pine cones, birds, entwining leaves and cartouches - are used almost unchanged today in upmarket furnishings.

When Jane left employment to study full-time, she found inspiration in the patterns, colours and textures of damask for her mixed media work using fabric, paper and stitch. She also incorporated her love of text, later discovering that her mother, who had been a graphic artist in the 1930's, also made great use of calligraphy in her professional work. Some of her mother's artwork has been restored and reprinted in a series of cards under the "Eileen and Edith" name.
